Roman Ramble

This fascinating riverside and village walk takes you from Boroughbridge to a 14th century battle site, past Victorian and Elizabethan architecture and on to a real Roman settlement before bringing you back to your starting point.

Before or after your walk, it's worth taking some time to explore more of Boroughbridge itself. In his 1908 book The Enchanting North, J. S. Fletcher wrote: "Anyone who loves the sight of old English towns should visit Boroughbridge".

Walk Information

The walk is three-and-a-half miles (5.5km) long and should take around an hour-and-a-half at a steady pace. Park in Boroughbridge's main car park off Fishergate. Start at the walk interpretation panel on the Library in St James Square. Follow the route shown by the purple waymarkers. Please clean up after your dog.
